#### Cormorants

The cormorant problem in freshwater rivers etc and estuaries was debated at some length at last night's MAA meeting/ Delegates requested that the matter be taken up asap with Fisheries Victoria

## Frankston fishing improved with recreational reef

Recreational fishers at Frankston Pier should start to notice more fish in the area thanks to a new recreational reef recently installed by the Victorian Government.

The reef, along with another two installed in November in Port Phillip Bay, have been paid for with \$400,000 of proceeds from the sale of recreational fishing licences.

The reef will attract more fish to the area by providing the right shelter and habitat. This is great news for recreational fishers who like to fish from Frankston Pier. The reefs should be rapidly colonised by marine life, providing immediate fishing opportunities this summer, but will take several years to reach their full angling potential. Snapper are likely to be one of the main species attracted to the reefs. Other species likely to occur on the reefs periodically include leatherjackets, pike, flathead, King George whiting, yellowtail scad, salmon, squid and silver trevally.

The new reef is located in water three to four metres deep, within casting distance at the end of Frankston Pier. It consists of a total of 99 dome shaped concrete reef modules of different sizes. The reef modules range between 170 and 340 kilograms in weight and 50 to 60 centimetres in height. Each reef module has a number of holes and cavities in it to allow water flow and provide refuges for marine life.

## Summer stockings of Murray cod continue

Victorian fishers will have more chances to land an iconic Murray cod in the future with 362,000 fingerlings released into seven waters throughout northern Victoria as part of this summer's stocking program.

Some of the recently stocked Murray cod fingerlings were grown at the Department of Primary Industries' Snobs Creek hatchery, near Eildon, while others were supplied by hatcheries in New South Wales.

These stockings are being funded by the Victorian Government's \$16 million Recreational Fishing Initiative and also by proceeds from the sale of recreational fishing licences.

The Murray cod stocking season will continue until around March this year when Fisheries Victoria's focus will turn to more stocking of golden perch, which breed later than the Murray cod.

Locations stocked with Murray cod so far this summer include:

- 8,000 into Lake Nillahcootie;
- 22,500 into the Goulburn River upstream of Lake Nagambie to Seymour;
- 23,000 into Lake Nagambie;
- 60,000 into Gunbower Creek between Torumbarry Weir Road and Cohuna;
- 70,000 into the Loddon River at Bridgewater, Serpentine and Fernihurst Weir;
- 100,000 into Kow Swamp; and
- 259,200 into Lake Eildon with more to come as part of the 'Murray Cod Million' project.

Murray cod fingerlings stocked this summer will take three to five years to reach the minimum legal length of 60 centimetres. If fishers are keen to target catchable size Murray cod in a stocked lake or river, they should refer to stocking histories from several years ago, all of which are available on the Department of Primary Industries website at www.dpi.vic.gov.au/fisheries

Last summer, Fisheries Victoria stocked more than two million native fish for the second consecutive year, including 885,000 Murray cod, to improve freshwater fishing opportunities.

#### Trout stocking delivers again for inland fishers

Victorian trout fishers continued to enjoy outstanding fishing last year thanks in large part to the Department of Primary Industries' annual stocking program.

More than 636,000 trout and salmon were released into 140 waters during the year to improve fishing opportunities for freshwater fishers across the state.

The stockings included nearly 75,000 catchable size rainbow trout that were released for the second and third term school holidays, mainly into small lakes in suburbs and towns. Those stockings provided children and beginners with a chance to wet a line close to home.

However, experienced trout anglers reaped the benefits of ongoing stockings in larger lakes such as Tooliorook, Deep, Elingamite, Burrumbeet, Learmonth and Fyans.

Large numbers of trout, some weighing more than 2kg each, were caught from several of these lakes throughout last year. One of the standout waters was Lake Toolondo, southwest of Horsham, which recovered from drought in 2011 and was stocked with brown and rainbow trout soon after, and again in 2012.

Fishers reported that the stocked trout in Lake Toolondo grew quickly and provided terrific fishing through winter and spring of last year.

Lake Wendouree is another water that's made an outstanding recovery over recent years thanks to stockings by Fisheries Victoria and the Ballarat Fish Acclimatisation Society.

#### Portland man faces charges for alleged abalone trafficking

A 37-year-old Portland man is facing a number of charges after allegedly taking far in excess of the daily bag limit for abalone while diving in December last year.

The man was observed diving for abalone in the Dutton Way area near Portland and was intercepted by Fisheries Officers as he came ashore.

He was allegedly found with 93 green lip abalone, even though the bag limit for the species is two per person per day. The permitted take of any species of abalone is a total of five per person per day, of which no more than two can be greenlip abalone.

Fisheries Officers seized the man's diving gear and vehicle as well as the abalone.
